Lesson Summary	Students will explore the Niiki (my home) iPhone/iPad application to learn about Myaamia language. They will use the application to write and illustrate their own picture books.	
Teacher Preparation	Teacher should spend some time learning the Niiki application to be able to assist students with writing their picture books. Teacher should also gather some examples of picture books to share with students.	
Instructional Procedure	<ol> <li>Teacher will allow students time to explore the Niiki application individually or in small groups</li> <li>Afterwards, the teacher will explain that the students will use the dictionary on the application to write and illustrate their own picture books.</li> <li>Teacher will pass out several copies of various picture books for students to read. This will help students come up with their own ideas for a story.</li> <li>Students will pair up into groups to start outlining ideas for their books.</li> <li>Once the teacher has approved their outlines, the students will start writing and illustrating draft pages of their books, either by hand or by using publishing software on computers.</li> <li>The teacher will review the students' drafts and will provide feedback and suggestions for improvement.</li> <li>Students will complete the final drafts of their pictures books, along with a one-paragraph Artist's Statement explaining the topic choice for their books.</li> <li>Each group will read their picture books out loud to the class.</li> </ol>
